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Overview

The Primary Visual Arts curriculum is designed to empower learners to view and interpret the world through an artistic lens. Visual arts serve not only as a means of creative expression, but also as a powerful tool for fostering transdisciplinary connections and deepening learners' understanding of both the world around them and their inner selves.

The Nexus Visual Arts programme consists of two main strands - Creating and Responding. Moreover, it emphasises the development of artistic practice, guiding learners to think and work like artists. Learners cultivate key studio habits which are also integral to the IB Visual Arts curriculum:

- Develop Craft
- Engage and Persist
- Envision
- Express
- Observe
- Stretch and Explore
- Reflect
- Understand and Appreciate Art Worlds

These skills are designed to foster the inquiry, creativity, and international-mindedness essential for authentic artistic growth.

Learning in the visual arts is understood as a developmental journey, where artistic growth is nurtured through exploration, reflection, and practice. From Nursery to Year 6, learners engage in a wide range of experiences that allow them to both create and respond to artwork across diverse media and contexts.

The curriculum is anchored in authentic connections - to self, to artists and their practices, to cultures past and present, to the environment, and to the technical and expressive possibilities of materials. Skill-building is intentionally balanced with the cultivation of imagination and free-flowing creativity, ensuring learners develop confidence as both thinkers and makers.
